Plant It Forward provides Houston with fresh, local produce by helping refugees grow their own urban farm businesses. Each farmer is trained to farm using organic methods and to sell their produce through farmers markets, farm stands,

restaurants, and farm shares.

Plant It Forward offers economically disadvantaged refugees an opportunity to become self-sufficient through growing, harvesting and selling produce from a sustainable urban farm within the city of Houston. Each farm will have the potential to generate a fair wage for a family of four while providing premium sustainably-grown produce to Houstonians. Each farmer must have had prior farming experience, usually in their home countries and must complete a rigorous 12-month training program to be certified as a Plant It Forward farmer and entrepreneur. At the successful completion of the program, each farmer receives a mentor and an urban micro-farm to grow and sell their own produce under the Plant It Forward brand.



Plant It Forward Farms provides refugees with the tools, training, and business skills needed to become successful urban farmers. Houston is settling a record number of new refugees every year, many of whom have fled violence in their homelands and are starting new lives without the job or language skills needed



to succeed. Plant It Forward Farms is helping these refugees become self-reliant entrepreneurs who can support their families and help our city grow.



Report from the President of the Board

As the summer heat is upon us, we are midway through 2016. Likewise, I am halfway through my term as President of the Board of Trustees. This is an appropriate time for a few observations about our church and its activities. I thought I would do this from a somewhat unique perspective. My first term as President was 33 years ago in 1983! I thought it might be interesting to compare 1983 and 2016.

Our church campus has changed significantly. We did not have Delaney Hall in 1983. There was no gathering space immediately outside the sanctuary. One had to go over to Westwood Hall for coffee and conversation. The RE classrooms were somewhat rustic and not well connected to the other facilities. Notably, Delaney Hall was constructed as a green space, and today we make good use of our facilities for both Emerson and community activities.

Emerson Church is more complex than it was in 1983. Our current mix of young and old members also existed then, but my sense is that it was more homogeneous. Worship services tended to be more formal and similar from week to week. Today, I am greatly impressed by the diversity in the form and content of the weekly services. Music was developing in 1983 with paid section leads in the choir. Today, our music program performs at a much higher level than one would expect from a church our size. We now also feature instrumental music, including the Emerson Intergenerational Orchestra.

The greatest difference I see between 1983 and 2016 is the commitment to social action and justice. Quite frankly, we didn't do much in that regard in 1983. Now we are very active, extending our influence through collaborative efforts with others. Examples are our support and involvement in Texas UU Justice, our strong stance in support of LGBTQ issues, our new Outreach Committee that has directed funds from our Endowment to meaningful initiatives, including health care for all Texans. Our ESL program (English as a Second Language) has reached people with a real need and in the process has actively involved our members with the community.

There are many more similarities and differences. Emerson was then, and remains so now, a community that invites diversity and is committed to the greater common good.

Emerson Takes Leading Role in Lifting up the Basic Human Need for Health Care

After months of planning and research, Emerson's elected Outreach Committee has extended grants to Planned Parenthood and Texas Impact, two worthy organizations that are involved in extending health care to all Texans.

We are proud to have jump-started a statewide campaign to enlist faith communities throughout Texas to enhance the future of health care in our state. "If you are a poor and uninsured resident," states a Houston *Chronicle* editorial, "Texas is terrible for your state of health."

What can one church do about that?

The obvious answer: Join with others, through Texas Impact, an Austin-based consortium of religious congregations working to influence the Texas Legislature. Use the "people power" of many faiths to communicate to legislators, and provide materials to the leadership of those congregations to explain why that communication could change the lives of hundreds of thousands of Texans.

ABOVE POLITICS



The Texas Impact campaign is called ABOVE POLITICS: Health Care for All Texans. Emerson pledged \$50,000 as a two-year commitment to fund this effort, joined by a \$100,000 grant from the Episcopal

Health Foundation. Our funds come from 3% of the average of the total value of the endowment for the trailing three year period.

REACHING BEYOND OUR WALLS

Our grant of \$25,000, with additional support from Emerson congregants, has enabled Planned Parenthood Gulf Coast to launch *Reaching Beyond Our Walls*, a Faith Leaders Outreach Program, and continue a comprehensive communications strategy to counteract the opposition attacks on Planned Parenthood. Anjel Johnson, PPGC Public Affairs Field Manager, is actively implementing the program and we look forward to an update in September.


Progress on Fund-A-Need 2016: Extending Our Welcome

Thanks to all the generous donors we are taking steps to improve the safety, sustainability and beauty of our buildings and grounds. So far the money raised in the auction has paid for:

- Installation of new light fixtures with brighter LEDs all around Delaney Hall.
- Pruning of major dead and damaged branches from all trees, including trimming trees on north driveway to meet safety standards. A reinforcing cable in a large dual-stemmed tree near the playground to support its continuing growth safely was also added.

IN PROGRESS: Contracting with our current grounds maintenance crew to remove the overgrown plants on the south side of Delaney Hall. Consulting with contractors and arborists on the safest, most effective and least expensive way to repair the uneven concrete between Delaney Hall and Westwood Hall.





More about our Adult RE Offering for the 2016 Summer

This four-session UUA course on immigration justice is designed for congregational study groups, with the expectation that participants will gather for the four sessions. During the summer months, this may prove difficult, if not impossible. Therefore, this offering will be paced on an every other week basis with the off week offered for guest speakers or a modified repeat and/or recap session for those that weren't able to attend the original session.
