Alex and I wish to express our sincere appreciation to all of you for sharing the

experience of our wedding. The outpouring of your love, joy, acceptance, labor and gifts was overwhelming. You will never know how much it meant to both of us. Alex and I had envisioned a perfect and elegant wedding. Everyone assured us that it would be, and thanks to you, it was.

Neither of us has had a pimple for nearly thirty years, <u>until the day of the wedding</u>. The attire we initially planned to wear didn't fit and had to be changed at the last minute. The photographer had an unexpected emergency and sent word that he would send an assistant in his place-who arrived late. The disc jockey, (who was provided a complete playlist of music on CD), didn't play a single song we requested. The music

stopped unexpectedly (three times) in the middle of our first dance. We were briefly devastated.

Then Alex and I observed something interesting. The entire crowd was dancing with wild abandon to music they appeared to enjoy. We ended up with two photographers instead of one. People commented that the first dance was the perfect metaphor for marriage (i.e. working through unanticipated hiccups). We had anticipated a perfect wedding, and you gave us one.

What we've learned: Alex and I have been together for over a decade. The affection we share for one another was not greatly affected by the wedding ceremony. But that isn't what the ceremony was about. It was about sharing the experience of that affection with all of you. It was about our connection to community. It was about the love that abounds between and among us within that community. Inasmuch, it was a perfect day. Not because of the tuxedos, or the music, or the dance – but because of you. How could it have been anything other than perfect?

The Women's Home



Throughout the month of April our Sunday plate offerings will benefit **The Women's Home**.

The Women's Home (The Home) was established in 1957 and built around a mission to help women in crisis regain their self-esteem and dignity and empower them to return to society as productive individuals. Its programs provide housing and support services to women who are homeless or on the verge of homelessness. Many of its residents suffer from addictions, mental illness, or

both. The Home believes that treatment must address and heal the whole person and embraces this value at its two unique campuses in the Houston area.

In Montrose, The Home's treatment and transitional housing program has 50 beds and offers residents up to 18 months of holistic support. Residents participate in residential, case management, clinical and vocational services simultaneously to achieve self-sufficiency through mental stability, sobriety, a livable income and safe permanent housing. In Spring Branch, The Home owns and operates an 87-unit apartment community, called Jane Cizik Garden Place (JCGP), which offers permanent supportive housing specializing in women centered services.

Women with children are one of the fastest growing homeless populations in the nation, and in response to this need The Home is developing a unique community for women and their families which will expand The Home's existing site in Spring Branch to include an 84-unit, two-and-three-bedroom apartment complex and a WholeLife Service Center. The new apartment complex will provide affordable housing and support services to families. The WholeLife Service Center will offer families in the surrounding community access to a variety of collaborative services including a Federally Qualified Health Clinic operated by Spring Branch Community Health Center, after-school and summer enrichment programs, behavioral health services, and workforce development.

Rebuilding Houston Together!

On the Saturdays of April 23rd and 30th (9:00 AM - 3:00 PM) we will be renovating a house that needs a little TLC and helping an elderly or disabled Houstonian living below the poverty line. There are many ways to help and you don't have to be a master carpenter to make a big difference! You can come either Saturday and for all or part of each day. We have a lot of folks who come out both Saturdays just so they can see the finished house! Lunch, water and soft drinks will be provided. If you would like to volunteer, please let us know which day you would like to help out. Friends, family, coworkers - they are all invited to help. I know that we have some folks who actually bring their own crews! We just need to know who is on your crew so we can plan for forward to seeing you! lunches.

If you do have home building or home improvement skills, please let us know your specialty so our mighty crew chief, Leo Vandermeulen, knows in advance. We are also looking for someone who has had First Aid training within the last 1-2 years who can be on-hand for either Saturday. If you can act in this capacity, please let Jane Zachritz know.

Also, if you would like to learn a new skill, there will be demonstrations throughout the day each Saturday. Each house is a different animal so the opportunities are endless! We will receive our house assignment on Saturday, April 9th and we will provide everyone with the address and a map upon receipt.

Spring is the Time for Renewal



Renewable Energy -- Dan Rigney, our "missionary" for renewable energy, attended an excellent T.E.J.A.S Toxic Tour with a group of Bay Area UUs featuring a trip to Manchester and points south. The talk and tour Sunday (March 13) focused on the Ship Channel

communities which are so heavily impacted by industrial proximity and pollution. Juan Parras, Founder and Director of t.e.j.a.s. Houston (Texas Environmental Justice Advocacy Services) guided the bus around the communities of Manchester and Smithville, historic communities dating to the late 1800s but lacking today in city services and pollution protections. Passengers were shocked to see a collapsing gas storage tank side by side with homes! Emerson Ministry for Earth plans to sponsor a similar tour later this year, perhaps with the First UU Climate Action Team.

Dan also established good contacts with the Climate Action Team at First UU, the Houston Peace and Justice Center and Pax Christi (a Catholic Peace and Justice group). Dan is spreading the word on Emerson's Renewable Congregations Campaign to many religious and civic organizations around Houston and the US. For Houston homeowners, we recently added more information about how individuals can support renewable energy until you can switch your contract to renewable energy.

Emerson Ministry for Earth is energizing our community: we will host a table for an upcoming Citizens' Environmental Coalition Summit March 24, 9 am to 3:15 pm, and an Emerson booth for Earth Day Houston on April 16 in Sam Houston Park. We will publicize not only the Renewable Congregations, but also Emerson and its many-splendored Ministry for Earth program.
