New Visioning Sessions Enhance Discernment Process

All Emerson church members and friends are invited to attend one of six sessions during July and August to engage a new process—

Creating a positive vision for Emerson Church

Simply plan to attend the one most convenient to you.

Why Visioning Sessions? Visioning allows us to look toward Emerson's future and what the ideal Emerson looks like. Board member Katie Scott will guide us through this process using Appreciative Inquiry. Instead of the usual problem-solving methods focused on what's not working, Appreciative Inquiry creates positive dialogue with groups to build on what works well. It is based on strengths and helps us look toward the future. Katie (assisted in two sessions by Rev. Sam Schaal), will facilitate these groups to:

- Create opportunities to engage all church members
- Dialogue about Emerson's strengths, successes, values and future
- Provide context for the church's discernment process

In these sessions each participant will be encouraged to

- Define our strengths (discover), and
- Imagine what we could be (dream)

Church members will work side by side to create visuals of Emerson now and in the future. These visuals will be categorized and displayed in the Gathering Place (with all creators having the option to remain anonymous). These visuals will remind us of the purpose of the discernment process and to assist us in defining who we are and who we want to be.

What is discernment? Following the death of the Rev. Mark Edmiston-Lange in September 2016, the question arose if that position needs to be replaced by a second minister, another staff position, or no position. In the June EMERSONIAN we announced a process beginning in the fall to help the congregation discern staffing needs, understand church heritage, and improve governance to support staffing. There was interest in the congregation to move ahead earlier, so the Board is adding these vision sessions open to all.

You are invited to any session to help discern the vision of Emerson Church.





Transitional Thoughts

Let Your Life Speak

Quaker author and activist Parker Palmer reflects on the old Quaker saying "Let your life speak" in his book of the same title. In his early thirties he was exploring a deeper sense of his vocation. He wanted to live to the highest truths and values he could imagine and he imagined being like his heroes: Martin Luther King, Jr, Rosa Parks, or Dorothy Day. His goal was a life of high purpose. He said he tried, and yet his life seemed not to be his. It was a noble way to live, but he slowly realized he was imitating heroes instead of "listening to my heart."

He says that letting his life speak now means to be faithful to the complexity of his own experience:

"Before you tell your life what you intend to do with it, listen for what it intends to do with you. Before you tell your life what truths and values you have decided to live up to, let your life tell you what truths you embody, what values you represent."

Doing so is not easy. It requires discernment. Churches, like individuals, have a vocation and need to be attentive to "letting its life speak." Elsewhere in this issue you'll see a new addition to our discernment process for the church announced in the last issuea series of visioning sessions open to everyone in the church. These sessions, in addition to other experiences summarized in that article, will help Emerson Church get a deeper sense of its vocation. To do that, we'll listen to the dreams of the congregation, how the church has done ministry over its 58-year history, how leaders envision staffing needs, as well as how we relate to each other in the governance of the church. Though it will entail many activities, it's really all about listening to the heart of the church.

- I. Public affirmation of the principles
- 2. Commitment to regular education around reproductive justice issues
- 3. Provide public witness for reproductive justice in the political arena and the media
