## REV. BECKY SPEAKER AT FOUNDATION FOR CONTEMPORARY THEOLOGY'S FISH BOWL EVENT

## **REVELS**

"So how are you – really?" The question came from someone I care about deeply and who cares equally for me, but whom I do not see all that often. We probably have the chance for a good, long face-to-face conversation, at best, about twice a year. And so when she asked the question, I knew she was asking me about where I was in my grief over Mark's death.

It's been a year and eight months now since Mark died. And I am indubitably in a much different place than I was last year at this time. I said to my friend that most often these days I feel gloriously alive, that life is good. I tell her how much I have been reveling in this rare and wonderful extended period of Spring we've been blessed with this year; how much I have enjoyed the occasions when I have been able to work in my yard and gardens. I tell her too that I am not nearly as tired as I was last year when summer approached; that I don't feel as if I desperately need to stop and catch up with my sorrow. But --- I also tell her that I still have moments when a feeling of being bereft inexplicably just sweeps over and takes possession of me.

Those moments come much less frequently now, are shorter in duration. Are they any less intense? Will they ever be? That I do not know. What I do know is that I feel myself turning toward the new with an eagerness and an expectancy I could not have foreseen months ago. What will happen in my life? What does the future hold for me? I can't know that either, but I am open to the possibilities.

There has been an unmistakable change in my psyche. Where before I had to correct myself from automatically saying "we" or "our", I often now observe myself readily saying "I" or "mine". When someone asks me when I moved to Houston, for example, without hesitancy I say "I moved here in 1999". The house I occupy has become "my" house in my head, and so on. That doesn't mean, of course, that any of all the life Mark and I lived together is forgotten or displaced, but simply that I have lived into a new reality without him.

And with that thought comes a different kind of sadness. Sadness that I *have* moved on. Sadness that I know it really is goodbye.

Grief is such a mysterious process. There's no controlling it; no gainsaying it. You just have to ride the wave. And, tough as it can be, grief always, always, reminds us that we have loved.

Dear beloved congregants, hold those dear to you close. None of us really know what the future will hold. Take every chance you can to celebrate life as the precious gift it is.

## WHAT'S IN A NAME?

What is meant by Reproductive Justice? It would not be surprising to find 10 different answers from 10 different people. The varying answers lie in the varying perspectives of the persons attempting to define the term's meaning. A young couple trying to start a family but experiencing problems with getting pregnant, might define it to mean having access to and the means to pay for fertility services. For the teen without means of support who finds herself in a "family way", yet desperately wanting to deliver and raise her child might declare reproductive justice to mean job opportunities with flexible hours, safe and affordable housing, employer-assisted day care, and obstetric and pediatric insurance coverage. The independent mother of four presently struggling with underemployment eking out a living

from meager paycheck to the next might define her reproductive justice to mean access to a safe and legal abortion.

Each of these scenarios represents an issue of both reproduction and fairness. Note that the first 2 are quite common and involve the desire to bear and raise a child. Yet the concept of reproductive justice seems to remain exclusively attached to the latter scenario – abortion.

What about males, the LGBTQ, and transgender communities? Do these groups have no reproductive justice concerns? What about the reproductive concerns as impacted by race, class, or immigration status? Do these factors deserve consideration? Reproductive Justice includes these concerns as well.

As Emerson moves toward a decision on becoming a Reproductive Justice Congregation (9/23/18), it is vital that we remain open to definitions of Reproductive Justice that are much broader in scope than the issue of termination of a pregnancy. While access to safe and legal abortion services must remain an important aspect of reproductive health and justice, it cannot be limited to that issue alone. Many other essential components of social justice are impacted and affected.

Equally important to know and understand, becoming a Reproductive Justice Congregation is not a referendum on the abortion issue. It is a declaration that reproductive health for all is a moral and social good and that in this particular house of worship, Emerson Unitarian Universalist Church, we will not stigmatize any who pass through our doors for any reproductive health choice made.

To get a little deeper into a discussion of this issue and initiative, there will be an Adult RE session on the initiative on June 10th. On June 17th there will be a Reproductive Justice Lunch & Learn in Westwood Hall after the service – Lunch will be provided! Please join the discussion of this important topic.



## TRANSITIONAL THOUGHTS

### The Platinum Rule

As you see elsewhere in this newsletter, in the fall we are moving into the transitional tasks of our ministry—the process to determine ongoing staffing needs, diving into the church's history to discover new aspects of how its culture formed, and updating church governance.

All this means change. Planned change, yes, with an eye to helping Emerson Church be more vibrant as it faces the future. Any change naturally introduces the unfamiliar which can be unsettling and makes us feel anxious.

So in these times, it's even more important to remember we are a community living in covenant with each other. You've heard of the Golden Rule. Let's call this the Platinum Rule of Community:

If you have a question or a problem with someone, talk to that person directly.

I've heard that some think the staff discernment process is preordained so the Assistant Minister position will continue. And also that the Board is moving the church toward "Policy Governance," a specific governance model some large Unitarian Universalist churches use. Neither is true—there are no predetermined outcomes. This process will be thorough, transparent and we'll work to keep the congregation informed.

If you have any questions or concerns about these transitional tasks, ask me, Rev. Becky or any member of the Board. We'll be happy to try to answer any of your questions.

### Bridge to Our Future

Discerning Staffing Needs

Understanding Heritage

• Improving Governance

Emerson Unitarian Universalist Church 2018-2019

In the fall, we will begin the transitional tasks we envisioned to discern staffing needs following the death of the Rev. Mark Edmiston-Lange in September 2016 after his 18-year service as co-minister with Rev. Becky. We envisioned this beginning shortly after hiring Rev. Sam Schaal as Transitional Assistant Minister, benefitting from his experience as a member of the Interim Ministry Guild of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). Hurricane Harvey delayed this work, just as it pushed the stewardship campaign to the spring and even today has left many families' lives still not restored to normal. We are ready to move forward in September, in three key areas:

### 1. Staffing Analysis

To provide strategic, practical information on how the congregation perceives its staffing needs

**September—November:** Using a staff consultant from the UUA Southern Region, we will create a task force of congregational members with experience in diverse aspects of the church, working with Rev. Sam. The consultant will train the team to conduct structured interviews with each minister, staff member and lay leader of significant ministries/programs to see what's going well, what needs better support, and how that support might be given. Using analysis tools, the task force will suggest if and where more staff support is indicated, including reviewing costs associated with various options. Their recommendation would be given to the Board for consideration, who will present the findings to the congregation in dialogue sessions. The task force will be accountable to the Board who will communicate progress and ultimate proposals to the wider congregation. There is no cost to use the UUA staff person unless she makes a personal visit and we pay travel expenses. There is a modest cost of \$100-200 for a demographic study that's part of the process.

**November—December:** If the church decides to seek a new clergy or non-clergy position, a search team will be named that will coordinate the search using the early spring national UUA search cycle for fall placement.

### 2. History Wall

By remembering our stories, we'll better understand how church culture has evolved over 58 years

**September 30, October 7, 14, 21:** Over four Sundays after worship, Rev. Sam will lead a timeline and discussion of church history from 1960 to the present. Remembering the church's story will reveal trends in the heritage still influencing life in the congregation—the DNA of Emerson, if you will. We will keep an eye on staffing, organization and, especially, the hopes and challenges of the congregation through these generations.

### 3. Governance Task Force

Good governance supports staffing and empowers effective leadership

**Beginning May 2018:** Church governance is the "invisible structure" of the church, since its constitution and bylaws affect working relationships and processes. The current church governance has not been significantly reimagined since 1960 and is designed for a smaller church in a time when the minister was central in church administration with scant committee/lay leadership and a small staff. We are already beginning conversations at the Board level and will apprise the congregation as progress is made. This longer-term task will extend into 2019.

This work will involve the whole congregation at various levels. We are excited about new discoveries of who we are, what we need, and where we are going as a congregation. Stay tuned!
