When I last wrote for this column, it was not long before I attended General Assembly (GA), the annual meeting of our Unitarian Universalist Association. GA was in Kansas City this year. It was the second GA I've attended since Mark's death and I wasn't really prepared for how much grief I experienced while there. But, we attended GA together over 28 years, so it isn't surprising that GA would bring back a flood of memories associated with Mark. In addition, I kept running into folks who would ask after him - "Where's Mark?" or "How is Mark?", because they had either forgotten his death or never learned of it. And then I would have to tell the story yet again, experience their shock and grief and, of course, re-experience some of my own.

Interestingly, while we at Emerson are involved in our own "discernment process" about the future of this congregation, the UUA is itself going through a process of discernment regarding how to truly be an Anti-Racial, Anti-Oppressive, Multicultural institution while wrestling with declining membership and concerns about what form "church" will take in the years ahead. It is a challenging time for most denominations in America. Nonetheless, it was good to be there in KC, to be part of the conversation and to see beloved colleagues.

In the time since GA I have been on vacation and study leave. I have been blessed by visits with my brother and friends, some time spent at the beach and in the mountains, time to attend to deferred household maintenance items (some unanticipated!), and time to discharge my civic duty of jury service (blessedly short). I also had time to reflect, to read, to "just be" - and for that I am deeply grateful.

The church and church members were never far from my mind. I had several pastoral exchanges via phone call, email or text. I got a jump ahead on worship preparation for the coming weeks. And I have tried to stay abreast of developments at church vis a vis the "discernment" process. I want to thank the Board, other church leaders and volunteers, and the rest of the staff for their dedicated and thoughtful leadership during this time.

It's good to back. I look forward to seeing what the year ahead will bring. And, again, I am deeply grateful for the time away. Blessings to you all.







The Reproductive Justice Congregation Initiative – Last Call!

For the past two years, I have sought a congregational vote on this initiative to have my church be the first in Houston to do so. We are here. **Sunday, September 23rd,** after the service, in the Sanctuary. We have held meetings, discussion, polled the members, and held question and answer sessions. The initiative says the following:

- We respect and trust women; (We do!)
- We believe that access to affordable health care, including reproductive health services, is a moral and social good. (We do!) (We do not take a position on how to make such care accessible and affordable.)
- We will not stigmatize anyone for any reproductive healthcare choices made, including abortion. (We do not now, nor will we in the future!)

If approved, our congregation will decide what level of participation we will pursue as it relates to reproductive health can justice.

- 1. We will publically proclaim the above principles.
- 2. We will offer accurate educational offerings to our members and the greater community on topics related to reproductive health.
- 3. We will participate in advocacy and public witness in support of reproductive justice.

We have done, are doing, and will continue to do these things because this is who we are.

Welcome, Sojourner!

It is the season of homecoming at church. Worship attendance and program participation increase as we gather again in fuller force

Maybe this isn't the only homecoming going on.

As a transitional minister serving congregations during shorter pastorates, I have the luxury of experiencing different communities and church cultures. What I find notable about Houston is its international character. In common places out in the community, I hear people speaking languages I can't understand. I notice distinctive native dress. The blend of cultures is remarkable and rich.

I think we don't fully appreciate either the city's international flavor, or the success of one of our ministries with the immigrant population. Our English as a Second Language (ESL) program conducts classes during the fall and spring that serves people from all over the world—in last spring's class there were students from more than 50 countries. If you've been in the building on a Saturday afternoon, or Tuesday and Thursday evenings, you've seen the halls full of people speaking various languages.

It's not uncommon for an occasional ESL student to be struck by the wall sculpture in The Gathering Place of the world's religious symbols with our flaming chalice. Most have never seen a church that actually honors all these diverse traditions (with perhaps



one of the symbols reflective of their native religion). I'm told some students take a cell phone picture to send back home.

It has caused me to think about the mission of our faith. We have a remarkable ministry serving the immigrant population of Houston, reflective of the global character of our faith. It is one of the largest, most successful social service ministries I've ever seen in a church.

In this season of homecoming, let's also celebrate the homecoming we give the international sojourner—one who may be with us only a short time, yet feel a warm, supportive welcome here that touches their lives for years to come. This is ministry. Welcome home.
