The power of fundamentalisms around the world wax - or wane?

Within fifteen years, we hope to establish a human settlement on Mars. Teams are hard at work to equip them for the journey. How will they live together in tight spaces? What might they encounter in their explorations?

And what of our children and youth here on Earth? How shall we develop and sustain their creativity and grace to prepare them for an increasingly complex future?

Children already in Emerson's nursery have an excellent chance of reaching the twenty-second century! How can our faith community help them to thrive and to take on challenges and opportunities we have yet to imagine?

How might we retool our religious education program for the twenty-first (and twenty-second) century to grow the Unitarian Universalists who play a role in changing the world for the better?

## **Celebrating the Declaration of Religious Freedom and Tolerance**

On January 13, 2016, the Hungarian Unitarian Church honoured the 448th anniversary of the Declaration of Religious Freedom and Tolerance, an edict which might be considered as the first legal guarantee of religious freedom in the Christian Europe.

448 years ago, in 1568, on January the 13th, the Diet of Torda (Transylvania) proclaimed: His majesty, our Lord, in what manner he – together with his realm – legislated in the matter of religion at the previous Diets, in the same matter now, in this Diet, reaffirms that in every place the preachers shall preach and explain the Gospel each according to his understanding of it, and if the congregation like it, well. If not, no one shall compel them for their souls would not be satisfied, but they shall be permitted to keep a preacher whose teaching they approve. Therefore none of the superintendents or others shall abuse the preachers, no one shall be reviled for his religion by anyone, according to the previous statutes, and it is not permitted that anyone should

threaten anyone else by imprisonment or by removal from his post for his teaching. For faith is the gift of God and this comes from hearing, which hearing is by the word of God."

The Hungarian Unitarians celebrated this special day with events in Torda and Kolozsvár. The celebration started in the morning in the Unitarian church of Torda with a worship service lead by Rev. Alpár Solymosi, minister of the Csíkszereda Unitarian congregation.

The service was followed by a visit to the Museum in Torda, which hosts the famous painting by Aladár Körösfői-Kriesch, commemorating the event.

The celebration was continued with an evening worship service in the Unitarian church of Kolozsvár, with István Török, Unitarian minister of Olthévíz and dean of the Háromszék-Felsőfehér district as preacher, followed by greetings from representatives of other denominations and guests. A concert featuring the Pálffy Ákos Choir from Homoródszentpál and the Concordia quartet enhanced the festivities.

The day was closed with a reception at the Unitarian headquarters.

In 2015, the General Assembly of the Hungarian Unitarian Church voted in unanimity to recommend to Unitarians and Unitarian Universalists around the world to join in the proclamation and celebration of January the 13<sup>th</sup> as Day of Religious Freedom.

**Continued from front page** Each of these and other challenges confront us all with amazing opportunities for substantive progress in the well-being of people and the planet. It could be said that some of our fondest hopes for the future are more likely to come true than they ever have before. But there is a big "if" that goes along with our building that future. Is:

- Our analysis of our circumstances profound enough to move us beyond the stuck places of so many of our moral and political debates?
- Are we and our children knowledgeable enough about the underlying dynamics so that we do not easily fall prey to cynicism and "business as usual?"
- Our confidence in our principles deep enough to sustain us in the face of resistance and setbacks?
- Our view of the "arc of justice" comprehensive enough so that we can instill a hope that sees beyond despair?

How can we prepare our children to navigate what is an unprecedented moral landscape with integrity and grace? How can we empower them to serve as witnesses to and spokespersons for the enduring worth of equality, freedom and justice? Will our children and youth be in a position to take advantage of the potential for progress?

Addressing these questions begins with a conversation with you so that together we can reconfigure the religious education experience at Emerson. We hope to see you on Saturday, March 5<sup>th</sup>. Collectively we can answer, "Yes, the children **are** well!" But we also feel it is important to do everything in our power to make sure that, "The children **will be** well!"

## **Emerson's English Class Project**

Emerson's ESL project is be the recipient of February's Share the Plate. This semester started off with a record breaking student attendance of 51 students and 23 children who were cared for by our paid child care workers. Emerson's English Classes are the only classes in the Houston area that we know that provides childcare for their students. Providing childcare allows our students who are responsible for caring for young children to take advantage of learning English. Our marketing efforts included taking flyers translated into Arabic to the Arabic Community Center and Interfaith Ministries Refugee Services, radio ads on a Spanish radio station, newspaper ads in a Spanish news



paper, and English, Spanish and Arabic flyers sent to multiple schools near the church.

This is the beginning of our third year to teach English to adults in our community. We have progressed from one class and one level the first semester to three different levels two days a week. We have six full time volunteer teachers, three for our Saturday classes and three for our Thursday night classes. We also have an average of 12 volunteers in each class to assist the teachers, test students, and volunteer in the class rooms. Our mission is to make the world a better place for those in our



community.

The Unitarian Universalist Funding Program awarded Emerson's English Classes Project a grant to assist with the 2016 school year; however, we are required to fundraise for matching grant funds. Please give generously in February for Emerson's efforts to change the lives of the immigrants and refugees in our community who need help with language skills to better

their lives and the lives of their children. The English Classes Project's leadership team consists of the following people who can provide you with additional information about the classes and about jumping in to volunteer: Leticia Anderson, Ann May, David May and Deborah Landis who are the volunteer and class coordinators, Norbert Welk, Clara Kosloff, Gerry Shawa, Tina Obut, Norma Atherton, and Elisabeth Lindheim who are our full time volunteer teachers, Dennis Kirby and John Minear are our most consistent class room volunteers.
